Council of Minorities at a glance

Council of Minorities is a Human Rights organization with a special focus on establishment of minorities and indigenous Rights in Bangladesh... COM is aiming to bring radical changes in the minor section of the society to ensure the social, cultural, political, constitutional & economic rights of the minorities/indigenous peoples through partnership, networking, and advocacy and lobbying with the Government. Promoting and fostering mass awareness on minority rights and duties, Creating social awareness against social stigma, discrimination and xenophobia by performing arts, including drama and documentary films and enhance the capacity of minorities/indigenous peoples to organize minority rights training, seminars, workshops, Summits and minority fellowship program.

History of the Summit

This leadership summit is a pioneering initiative of council of minorities. It is the first ever minority leadership summit in Bangladesh that has been organized annually for the past six years. It was first introduced by Mr. Khalid Hussain, Executive Director of the Council of Minorities & Ms. Hannah Sholder, a community development and affordable housing consultant based in the USA in 2009, when Ms. Hannah Sholder first came to Bangladesh as a full bright scholar to study the land right situation and housing conditions of the camp-dwelling Urduspeaking community. After being introduced it was later organized in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014 & 2015 as a leadership training summit for Urdu-speaking youth. Later in 2017, the organizers extended their heartfelt welcome to all the youths belonging to different minority and indigenous community and made it the first ever leadership summit based on minority youth and made it free of cost for everyone. This year, Tamanna Sultana also joined the team as a training coordinator, and special thanks goes out to her for helping make the 2018 summit possible.

Objective of the Summit

- Council of Minorities aimed at identifying and grooming high potential individuals within marginalized communities.
- Preparing the youths for future leadership roles to end the miseries of their community.
- To make minority youths the agents of change by helping them to make strong network between all minority and indigenous communities in Bangladesh.
- Council of Minorities believes that a country cannot develop by leaving its minorities and underprivileged group behind. This summit is a small initiative of Council of Minorities towards equality, humanity and development.

Inauguration ceremony



Introduction (10.00-12.00 PM)

The National Minority & Indigenous Youth Leadership Summit started with the National Anthem Recitation in the presence of Mr. Khalid Hussain & Ms. Hannah Sholder via Skype, Mr. Shahriar Sadat and Mrs. Nilufa Sultana Sheta

Mr. Khalid Hussain expressed his solidarity with the participants and explained the theme that the summit carries this year "Social Relevancy of Minority Youth". He shared his views with the participants and the motive of COM in empowering the minority youth populace of the country.

Ms. Hannah Sholder, Executive Director of the summit welcomed the participants via Skype and shared her experiences and expectations with the participants.

Inauguration Ceremony was taken to the next level by Mr. Shahriar Sadat and Mrs. Nilufa sultana Sheta by carrying out ice-breaking activities, engaging the participants in team building and listening to their expectations from the summit, significant number of participants praised the initiative of COM as a timely one.

Session: Leadership Development Conducted By Motahar Akand (1.00-2.30 PM)

- The leadership session was the most awaited session of the summit. Mr. Motahar Akhond conducted this session in a very interactive, practical and lively manner.
- He commenced the session by asking the participants to write down the good qualities and the bad qualities of a leader and later on asked them to select 3 leaders among them.
- He pointed out the important elements and skills that a "Good Leader" should possess by picking up examples from various national and international platform.
- He wrapped up the session by a conclusive remark that "There is no magic formula for successful leadership; instead, each leader needs to figure out his or her own unique leadership signature-one that draws on his or her own strength".



Session: Human & Civil Rights including minority and indigenous rights Conducted by Mr. Tajul Islam (2.30-4.00 PM)

- The session began by differentiating between human rights and minority rights.
- Mr. Tajul further explained issues faced by the members of racial, ethnic, class, religious, linguistic, gender and sexual minorities in Bangladesh
- He clarified the participants why in Bangladesh the violation of human rights is higher in all spheres.
- He ended the session by providing information's regarding the possible steps to be taken in such circumstances as well as which organizations in Bangladesh work for such victims who are deprived of their human rights and minority rights & distributed various booklets among the participants.

<u>Session: Community Land Rights and Community-led Housing Development session conducted</u> <u>jointly by Ms. Hannah shoulder (via Skype from USA) and Mr. John Taylor(10.00-12.00 PM)</u>

- Ms. Sholder began the session by enlightening the participants with the basic idea of the community land trust.
- She discussed the history of "CLTs" and how it was originated in the United States by Ralph Borsodi and Robert Swann
- Later, how it was undertaken by various countries till now such as England, Canada, Belgium, Kenya, and Australia & New Zealand.
- She displayed a video based on "CLTs" model in Kenya for the participants to make them understand better about it.
- Mr. Taylor joined Hannah's talk and answer the questions asked by participants.
- He also discussed about the opportunities and challenges of implementing the Model in Bangladesh.

Session: Social Business Development by Mr. Mahade hassan (2.30-4.00 PM)

- Social enterprise is a growing and dynamic sector of a Bangladesh economy in recent time. By acknowledging the importance of social businesses, Council of Minorities introduce this session for the first time this year for its participants.
- Mr. Mahade Hassan began the session by explaining the importance of social businesses. How it could create jobs for disadvantaged groups, empower women and address social exclusion across the country.
- He shared his experiences and motivated the participants to become social entrepreneur in order to work for socially and economically disadvantaged community.
- He also discussed about how various successful social business venture of Bangladesh such as Grameen Bank, Grameen Danona and many more initiated their businesses and how the social enterprises works for the development of the country.
- The session ended with a lively question-answer session.









Session: Educational & personal Development By Mrs. Tanzina Pritha(4.00-5.30 PM)

- The session Commenced with the sentence pronounced by the legendary Nelson Mandela that perfectly depicts the importance of Education.
- She Discussed about the impact of education on personal growth, which, later on, influences one's relationships and success.
- She tend to inspire the participant by elaborating them that knowledge is a lifelong asset which can never be taken away from a person and can always be updated.
- In the process, she shared her own inspiring story of struggle and success with the participants
- She ended the session by showing a job interview video that depict how learning can improve one's confidence, how education improves one's standing in society. How it makes one feel good about one's self, how it allow one to put forth one's ideas more eloquently and lastly how education provides a firm foundation for a career.








<u>Session: Group Presentation on Community Activism by Mrs. Nilufa Sultana Sheta(1.00-2.30 PM)</u>
